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Notes of Meeting of 22nd December 2010

Meeting held at 7A, Adams Road: 20:00 to 22:15

1. Attendance

Ann Mullinger, Ron Clifton, Roger Crabtree, John Hipkin, Jane Singleton, Michael Bond, Clive Brown. Apologies from Nicky Morrison

2. Lessons from Public Meeting on 27th November

Positive

Interest generated: good for FeCRA: Councillors very positive, in particular Sian Reid: contact established with a nucleus of interested people: the Post-It process worked well: issuing the questions in advance of the meeting improved the meeting: good topic.

Caveats

Stunning amount of work resulted in a disappointing number of attenders (~60 registrants and only ~45 turned up): statement by one Reporter was very different from what his group had understood he would say: FeCRA might be in danger of being seen as too close to the LibDems because the meeting was politically imbalanced (as a consequence of the subject and purpose) – this caveat could be redressed by FeCRA having a joint meeting with Sian Reid and Louis Herbert: FeCRA needs to be clear that is does not have any mandate since it is not an elected organisation: need to get information about meetings circulated much wider – some (even many) of the FeCRA contacts appear to not circulate information: the delay in the issue of the Government Localism Bill reduced the meeting effectiveness.

Other pointers for any future events

Identify Group reporters before the meeting and give guidance: issue breakout group questions before the meeting: if appropriate, agenda should allow for alternative political views to be presented: seek Council assistance with logistics (eg publicity and venue) given local government obligations to support local groups.

3. Meeting Reports

- 3.1 Copies of the drafts had been sent to Julian Huppert and Tim Bick for their comments, but as expected, none had been received.
- 3.2 After discussion, the meeting agreed that just one document with appendices is to be issued. The body of the document will be the meeting report as prepared by Ann and Ron with the section on the Reporters' feedback replaced by the introduction to the Breakout Group Feedback draft document. The feedback from each group will be an independent appendix.

 emphasise that the FeCRA Committee is seeking effective means of correlating the output from

 they can offer.

4. Follow-up actions by FeCRA on Localism

The meeting agreed with John's proposition that FeCRA and Residents need input from experts on the implications of the (very large) Localism Bill. The changes to the framework for neighbourhood planning could be very significant: what forums would take decisions, how they would be organised, etc.

John suggested Mills and Reeve as a possible source of assistance. The company has produced a summary report of the Bill and its implications. M&R might be prepared to sponsor a FeCRA event, if FeCRA could show how such an event would offer benefits to their clients. A good contact would be Beverley Firth.

The meeting discussed whether FeCRA should take up the specific issue of pushing for more consultation from the Councils on planned Cambridge area growth, the provision of sufficient social housing coupled with a reduction in the total planned, and a local referendum on the matter. The meeting agreed to review which specific topics should be pursued once a better understanding had been obtained of the opportunities likely to be provided by the Localism legislation.

Richard Footit was an appropriate contact for Rose Taylor on the basis that she would progress matters directly without further involvement from FeCRA.

Doubts were expressed about the circulation of Cambridge First as compared with Cambridge News and the free weekly "News and Cryer". Chris Havergall was suggested as a good contact at the Cambridge News.

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6. Any Other Business

6.1 **Meeting Accounts**: Clive reported that the collection for refreshments on 27th November raised £93.65. Ann reminded the meeting that WIRE had agreed to provide £20 to support the event. Also, the the Council agreed to pay £250. Noting that Newnham would be billing FeCRA £187.50 for 75 coffee and biscuits at £2.50 each, plus £60 for the room hire (concessionary "Fellow" rate), the meeting agreed that Newnham be invited to bill £100 for the room. Additionally, the meeting has been charged £7.50 for the flipchart pad (half of which remains unused).

The balance from the 27^{th} Meeting will provide a modest increase to the FeCRA reserves.

6.2 Information Circulation

The meeting agreed that the circulation of information by FeCRA contacts can and should if practical be improved.

The challenges of maintaining up to date email addresses was noted.

6.3 Cambridge Vision

Following the FeCRA meeting with Peter Carolin some months back, Roger has joined the Steering Committee for "Cambridge Vision" that is aiming at producing a view of what Cambridge should be in 2030 regarding Economics and Technology. There will be a small workshop of experts in January followed by a second, for a wider audience, probably on the evening of 14th March.

6.4 Purpose of Resident Associations

John stated that in his view, RAs have three roles which are, not in any order of priority:-

- Bring local people together to socialise
- Get stuff done for locals eg local safety grants
- Represent local committees politically

6.5 Potential issues

The meeting noted the following related potential issues:-

- Speculative developers seeking planning permission for student accommodation (vide recent rejected planning application for the garage site at the junction of Histon Road and Huntingdon Road).
- The establishment of "Apartment Hotels" that qualify for business rates even though they are to all intents and purposed conventional flats. As a result the City, which has to provide all services, does not get any Council Tax benefit.
- Need to get the different parts of the Council staff to act cooperatively, and to overcome the challenge for outsiders to find who is responsible for what.

6.6 Possibility of establishing "local Parish Councils"

Michael point out that under the Local Community Act of 1972, there are arrangements for the establishment of Parish Councils and some hybrid form might assist local community activism.
